A couple of years ago, I bought a new camera. I've always been interested in photography, and this camera gives me the options to really customize the settings for whatever conditions I want to shoot in. The big problem is that I don't know what any of these settings do!

That Christmas, I received *Digital Photography: A Complete Course*, a book which says it will teach me to be a better, more educated, photographer. It's promise: in only 20 weeks, I can master the art of using my camera in the correct way.

Twenty weeks!?! I don't want to wait twenty weeks...I want to know all of that now!

I realize that to learn just about anything properly takes time. It takes patience. It takes commitment. But I suspect I am not alone in wishing that more things in life could just be instantaneous...that things could just happen more quickly.

That desire for instant gratification may seem like a sign of the times, but the Bible reminds us that people have always known what they wanted, and have always been frustrated when what they wanted didn't materialize as quickly as they would have liked.

Our Lenten Bible Study this year will focus on the Book of Jonah—a familiar name to many of us among the Old Testament prophets, who's story is, perhaps, the most un-prophet-like story in the Bible. Jonah thinks he knows better than God what should happen to the people he is sent to preach to, and he throws a fit when things don't happen quickly enough and in the way he would prefer them to happen.

I don't want to give too much away about what we will be talking about, but suffice it to say, Jonah might find himself at home in the hurried and frantic pace of our lives today. Think about it: we want our churches back to the way they were before COVID...we want a more stable economy and lower inflation...we want peace in the Middle East and in Ukraine...we want more sunshine in the winter...and when do we want all of this?!? Now!

But the writer of Ecclesiastes reminds us that all of this will be resolved in due time. In recent months, I have been using the following passage as part of my prayer times. I find that saying these words with intention, not only helps calm my general anxiety about the state of the world today, but also helps to give me perspective on some of the larger issues facing our churches. I offer these words to you this month, in the hope that they might aid your time of prayer, as well:

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven:

a time to be born, and a time to die;

a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted;

a time to kill, and a time to heal;

a time to break down, and a time to build up;

a time to weep, and a time to laugh;

a time to mourn, and a time to dance;

a time to throw away stones, and a time to gather stones together;

a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing;

a time to seek, and a time to lose;

a time to keep, and a time to throw away;

a time to tear, and a time to sew;

a time to keep silence, and a time to speak;

a time to love, and a time to hate;

a time for war, and a time for peace.

What's the Big Idea? An Introduction to the Books of the Bible: The United Reformed Church


This month we are looking at Exodus, the second book of the Old Testament. Its name means departure, reminding us that Israel's flight out of slavery in Egypt is the major focus of the book.

Exodus is a book of two halves! The first part (chapters 1-19 & 32-34) is the story of an oppressed people who are delivered from slavery into a life of freedom. The second half (chapters 20-31 & 35-40) consists of detailed instructions about the life and worship of God's people. The book introduces us to their *salvation* or deliverance, as *story*. God's promises to Abraham are fulfilled as the people journey to the Promised Land. He also renews His covenant with them at Sinai, expressed in the Ten Commandments (20: 1-17).

At the heart of Exodus is the person of God Himself. In chapter 3 God reveals His name as YHWH or '*I am who I am*' (3:14) to Moses. This is the name by which God is known throughout the Old Testament, expressed in the title '*the LORD*'. To know God's name is to know Him, as well as His character ie His justice, truthfulness, mercy, faithfulness and holiness. He is the God who controls history, delivering the people out of Egypt, while the death of the Passover lamb points us to Jesus' death on the cross (1 Corinthians 5:7).

God's promises of help remain true for us today: 'Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the deliverance the LORD will bring you today' Exodus 14:13.

More Bible Thoughts

Have you ever read or attempted to read the Bible cover to cover? I did in my late teens, round about the time I was baptized and again quite recently over the last year or so, but have to confess it was quite heavy going. It also required a large dose of discipline, which I have to admit sometimes evaded me.

The Bible consists of 39 books in the Old Testament and 27 in the New, giving a total of 66 and by my calculations there are 1,199 individual chapters contained in these books. If you set a course to read a chapter a day it would take up to 3.25 years to complete, however two or three chapters at a time would obviously reduce this. During a radio program at the time of the Centenary (4th) commemorations of the King James translation of the Bible, someone rang in to say that they had read the Bible cover to cover in 2 to 3 weeks whilst hospitalized, which took me by surprise judging from my own experience – was this just the New Testament I wondered – if not "burning the midnight oil" comes to mind!

As a teenager in The Boys' Brigade one of our Officers suggested as a starter, to read the book of Proverbs (basically King Solomon's instructions for his sons) and having done so I could understand why, as to use a modern idiom 'it tells it how it is' e.g. **"The fear of the lord is the beginning of wisdom" "A good name is more to be desired than great riches" "A soft answer turns away anger" "Do not reject the teachings of your mother" and much more.

As Christian people we might consider the New Testament to be our only point of reference, however the importance of the Old Testament should not be underestimated but deserve equal status, as this in many instances points the way to the events that take place in the New.

The Bible over the centuries has been a great power for good in peoples lives and will continue to be so - if you should wish to challenge yourself to read the Bible cover to cover then go at it, at your own pace and good luck.



I find that watching buds swelling on trees and plants during the winter months gives me a tremendous sense of hope. After creation's winter shutdown, the sight of tiny flowers poking out of brown earth may be more important than ever.


Getting outdoors during daylight hours, enjoying green spaces and getting some fresh air and exercise are great ways to keep ourselves healthy at any time of year. A psychologist colleague wrote, "Attending to the details of nature can also inspire awe, which has been linked to positive mood and increased life satisfaction." I expect it is this sense of awe that makes it easier for many of us to connect with God outdoors.

Helping ourselves and others to thrive is a good start to 2024, but it is also vital to have hope for the future. In the face of climate change, we urgently need to care for all of Creation, both human and everything else, with God's help.

Our ultimate hope is in God's promise that He will bring about a new heaven and a new earth. We can look forward to the day when Creation will be fully redeemed and liberated from evil. The Greek word used to describe the new creation is the same as that used to describe someone who becomes a Christian, whose humanity is restored and renewed. There will be continuity between the old and new earth as it is cleansed and purified, surpassing and perfecting what has gone before. There will also be some discontinuity, as there will be no more suffering or death.

So, one source of hope for 2024 is that we can enjoy both caring for and meeting God in Creation. But the parts of Creation that we find most beautiful, giving us a sense of awe and helping us to worship, are also a reminder that there is something much better to come.

Lenten Valentines'



This month both Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day fall on the same day! The link between the two can be summed up in terms of the nature of real love! Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday, focuses on learning to love God more, as we give Him space in our lives. This is what Jesus found when He was led into the desert by the Spirit to be tempted by Satan. (Luke 4:1-13).

Jesus was tempted to turn stones into bread. Yet loving God and His word comes before satisfying physical desires.

Satan tempted Jesus to worship him. However, worshipping God is an expression of loving God and serving Him.


Finally, He was tempted to put God to the test, by jumping off the Temple. Real love for God does not put Him to the test, but wants to obey Him.

Lent also teaches us how to live out the love of God in practical ways, as we follow Jesus in the in the way of the Cross. We see this clearly demonstrated in the life and death of Saint Valentine.

Valentine was a Christian who demonstrated the importance of sharing God's love with others. We know little about him, except that he was a priest who lived in the 3rd Century AD and that he was martyred on 14th February. Emperor Claudius felt that soldiers in the Roman Army were distracted from their duty by their wives, and so had attempted to outlaw marriage. It is believed that Valentine married couples in secret, which is why today we celebrate our love for one another on his day.

In trying to understand the meaning of her revelations from God, Julian of Norwich found:

'What, do you wish to know your Lord's meaning in this thing? Know it well, love was His meaning.'
