## *Minister's Letter*

*Dear Friends,*

A big part of my life here is working with a school - I've been the chaplain really so did not want to leave until the end of term. Actually, we will have to miss the very end with leavers assembly because that is Tuesday 27th July, and we go camping on 9th August. The thought of moving and locating our equipment in 10 days is a bit of a stretch so our last full day here will be Sunday 25th.

We will be living in a village just outside Cambridge called Great Shelford where the Moderators manse is. God blessed us as the pastorate closest to the house was vacant and Phil has been called to serve three village churches. He is looking forward to the challenge. We are travelling to Cambridge this Friday (23/4/21) for the day to see the Manse and also drive round the villages he will serve (Sawston, Whittlesford and Castle Camps) for the first time.

My induction will be in Stowmarket on 4th September and I'm hoping that I will then lead Phil's induction on the 5th. Carys is coming with us. She was planning to stay in Exeter but a recent ruling about paying support staff who sleep overnight at work has seen her pay being slashed by £2-3,000 per year and she can't really afford that. A move might mean a change of direction and Cambridge will have lots of opportunities we think.

I think lockdown has meant many churches are having to consider what the future means for them and how to best serve their communities. I will be praying for Western Road and Heaton Way - I still love you all dearly.



## Dear Everyone,

Over the Easter week a number of us took part in Spring Harvest Home. We were going to go but as with many things the plans were changed. Nonetheless we were able to participate in a week's worth of teaching and celebrating on the theme of What is Worship. Jill has recommended the book from Spring Harvest for you to get hold of and read.



I want to share with you some of my thoughts following this event. Already some of you will be beginning to skim read this as you have the idea that Spring Harvest is for hand waving, dancing evangelicals and that it's not your sort of thing, and it is! However, it is also for the traditionalists, the liberals, the quiet reflective types, and in fact for everyone. Why? Because the whole of the experience is based on Biblical truth. That is not to say that I agreed with every bit of teaching, I didn't, but even when I disagreed it made me think.

In a nutshell the week centred on the idea that Worship is not a thing that we do, it is who we are in our relationship with Christ. We do not go to Church (or join zoom) to worship, we worship

at all times and Church on a Sunday is just the place where we meet to worship with others. If we have learned anything during lockdown, it has to be that just because a building is closed it doesn't stop us from

worshipping Almighty God. He doesn't need a building to meet His people in. He is there as you wash up, walk the dog, drive the car, go to the supermarket, watch tv.

Worship is about putting God first in your life and when that is true you will offer Him worship by being like Him. Gracious, loving, kind, serving, gentle, just, compassionate. When God is first in your life, and not a Sunday afterthought, when you can find him in the little things, the smile of a baby, a flower, a mobile phone, a sunset, then your relationship with Him and others will grow. The more we grow in His image, the more we will impact the world around us.

For in him we live, and move, and have our being; Act 17:28.

This was resonated in the teaching for the week when it was said.

“You are either part of the movement, or you are part of the monument”.

Are we prepared to move forward in our relationship of worship with our God or are we going to stick with the monument which is the Church? Are we prepared to change? Or are we ready to die out?

Worship is giving God the best that He has given you.

Just as worship begins in holy expectancy, it ends in holy obedience. If worship does not propel us into greater obedience, it has not been worship.

This is what I got out of Spring Harvest this year. Maybe next year you could join in by going to one of the venues or by taking part online.

Who we worship?



Why we worship?


and How we worship?

our lives to your will, as offerings of worship.**


